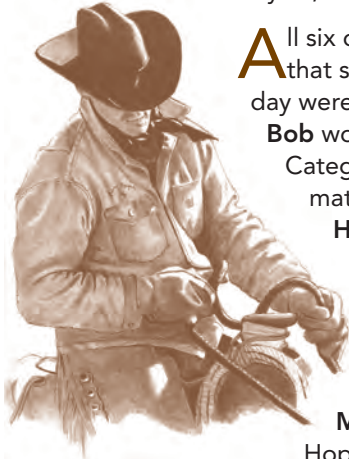

Shotgun turnout has been great since the restoration of the shot curtains and reopening of trap house three. We hope to keep moving forward in 2015 and installing the last two shot curtains, which will allow us to open trap house two. By having two working trap houses this will allow us to move through more shooters, which will shorten the wait time, and lighten the wear on the curtain panels. We now allow #7.5 and #8 shot, but by March we will only allow #8 shot. Anyone shooting at the pole trap during non-trap hours MUST abide by shot restrictions. The shot curtains are extremely expensive and any holes that form due to someone accidentally shooting a rabbit or water fowl load will not be tolerated, so please check your loads prior to shooting.

Shotgun held a raffle this past year to generate funds for the next two shot curtains, and we want to thank Bob & Mona Yurwitz for organizing and their hard work with the raffle. The winner of the rifle was **Sean Griffith**.

Thanks to John Michelli for submitting the Shotgun Cleaning tip for modern shotgun.

Quick Shotgun Cleaning Trick

To get your shotgun barrel as clean as it can be, using less elbow grease, try the following:

Remove the handle from your cleaning rod and insert it in a drill motor. Put a bronze brush on the rod and wrap a turn of fine steel wool around it. Put on a little of your favorite cleaning solution and run it through the barrel a couple of times. Next, push a jag through with a patch on it and you are finished. This is especially good at cleaning the nylon wad buildup in the forcing cone and choke.

Don't worry about this hurting your barrel. A shotgun barrel is made from 4130 Chrome Moly steel, which is much harder than the low carbon steel that steel wool is made from. In fact, steel wool is used to polish barrels after they come out of the Bluing tank!

BLACK POWDER...*An Editorial*

Just so you know up front, this is an editorial, or part of it is anyway. Last year we attempted to restart the Black Powder Bullseye matches. We got a good turnout for our first match, which started out with a pre-match tutorial in the clubhouse, featuring a wonderful session with Bill Palk who displayed a rather extensive brace of historical black powder handguns as part of the presentation and explained both the history of muzzleloaders as well as the "how to's" of loading and firing them. We moved to the range where we had 6 or 7 shooters, including some first-timers, and a couple more spectators vowing to return to shoot the next time. Our second match drew 4 shooters and even though interest was expressed as to when the next match would be held after that, the interest waned.

However, I'm not one to throw in the towel so easily. I KNOW there are Black Powder shooters out there among our membership, because the interest was there when we did the initial event last year. Plus, I always draw onlookers when I fire one of my smoke wagons on the Plinking Range, followed by ear-to-ear grins when I invite them to fire it after they've watched me load it. So I'm here to "smoke you out" and my question is, what, if anything, do Black Powder shooters in this club, new or experienced, want to see in the way of an organized event? Yes, I have something planned but I'm not letting that out just yet.

One of the things that rekindled this passion for me is, this past year, I went deer hunting for the first time in 10 years. This included hunting the late flintlock deer season up in PA. As I shopped the various outdoor stores, both the national chains and some local independents, to get some items related to my flintlock rifle, I discovered something disheartening. I found with the proliferation of modern, primer ignited muzzleloaders, the availability of "traditional" muzzleloader supplies is drying up, at least at the retail store level. I was saddened to see that the more traditional muzzleloaders have almost been "modernized" out of existence. I had difficulty finding flints, Pyrodex, (other than Pyrodex pellets), Black Powder, patches, (for patched balls, not for cleaning) and even percussion caps, (even though I wasn't really shopping for them). The irony was I was able to

find everything I was shopping for on the (modern invention of) the Internet.

I'm nowhere near an expert when it comes to muzzleloaders and I continue to learn, but I do have enough experience to know what I like and what works for me. All of my Black Powder guns are replicas, and I am thankful for the fact that they all have modern, strong, proof-tested steel in their barrels and in the frames and cylinders. And I confess

to using Pyrodex more often than Black Powder, both because of lack of availability of Black Powder and some of the burning characteristics I favor with Pyrodex. But I'm still kind of "Old School" when it comes to muzzleloaders. I still load them by pouring a measured amount of Black Powder (or Pyrodex) down the barrel or front of the cylinder, seating a lead ball on top of that charge, and then (on two of mine anyway) putting some powder in the pan, closing the frizzen and anticipating whether my flint will provide enough of

a shower of sparks to light the thing off. It's all of this, along with that deep BOOM, and all of the smoke and even the smell, that makes this such an enjoyable part of shooting sports, at least for me. Hey, I told you up front that this was an editorial.

However, other than sighting in and doing some practice to keep my skills and familiarity with the guns, there is no organized friendly competition with these firearms here, unless I choose to shoot Cowboy Action with them. But it would be nice to see this aspect of shooting sports here at the club, to shoot these guns alongside other like-minded shooters. To go back to my original purpose of this article, I pose this question: Is there an interest in this club that is substantial enough to make it worth the effort of conducting a special shooting event for Black Powder pistols...or even rifles? And what kind of event would you like it to be? Bullseye, steel targets? Would you like to see another tutorial session? I'm hoping the interest is there in substantial numbers to make it worthwhile to conduct one or more events throughout the year. Please reply to bambam612@comcast.net and let me know.

Rimfire Action

There are no match results to report this month as our January match is scheduled for January 25th, which is after this article is due in to the SCORE. We held a winter planning meeting on January 18th to discuss a few items that need attention this year. As I indicated last month, we have grown, averaging over 21 shooters per match last year, up from 16 in 2013. However, with growth comes growing pains. So there are a number of items that came out of our meeting.

There are basically six of us who put on these matches each month. However, these are also the same six people who put on the Cowboy Action Shoots. Additionally, we are involved in other activities as well. We need help administering the matches and would like some of our more experienced shooters to become involved. These are the things we need help with:

- ◆ Designing stages – **Bob Yurwitz** and I design the Rimfire Challenge and 2-Gun stages each month. We would like some others to step up and design the stages for some of the matches throughout the year. There are some basic things you need to know and we can help, but if you would like to try your creativity in designing stages, we welcome your help.
- ◆ Setting up targets the day before the match – **Bob** and I also set up the target arrays on Saturday afternoon after IDPA is done and need some help. We generally start at 1:00 pm and it only takes an hour. This makes the rest of the match set-up much easier on Sunday morning.
- ◆ Registering shooters – **Mona Yurwitz** is the one who does this for both the Rimfire Action and Cowboy Action matches. She also needs a break from those duties every once in awhile.
- ◆ RSO duties, including timing and running shooters – This generally falls on **Matt Nolte** and **Rich Elliott**, as well as **Bob** and me. **Matt** also compiles the match results each month and **Rich** writes stages for both Rimfire Action and Cowboy Action, as well as a lot of maintenance around the range. If one of us is unable to attend a match, we need another qualified RSO present to run the match. To facilitate this, the Safety Committee is working on scheduling some NRA RSO training classes to build up our RSO cadre. We can then take these RSOs and train them how to safely and properly time and run shooters through the course of fire.

In addition to giving the current crew a break from time to time and allowing us the chance to socialize and just relax a bit during the matches, we are getting more requests to

hold more than one Rimfire Action match per month. We simply cannot do this without having a larger cadre of members who are trained and willing to step up and help run the matches. We had a record 33 shooters at our November match last year. When we get more than 22 shooters, we have to split into two groups to keep the overall match length reasonable. We have determined that we must limit the number of shooters to 40 or the match simply takes too long to run. Holding a second match may alleviate the problem of too many shooters at any given match. We also discussed some procedural and rules changes, including how the matches are scored and clearing guns that jam. In addition, we will be conducting a long overdue clean-up of the Cowboy target shed on the Action Range. These items will be covered in the safety briefing at this month's match and then covered in more detail in next month's article.

We should point out that we are not complaining. Just the opposite, we are all very proud and pleased at what this match concept has become. We have introduced numerous new shooters to Action Shooting and provided an outlet for experienced shooters to have a good time while challenging their skills. But it has become necessary to recruit more help in putting on these matches. Please note the upcoming scheduled matches are different from our normal 4th Sunday. The February match will be held on Sunday, February 15th and the March match will be Sunday, March 29th.

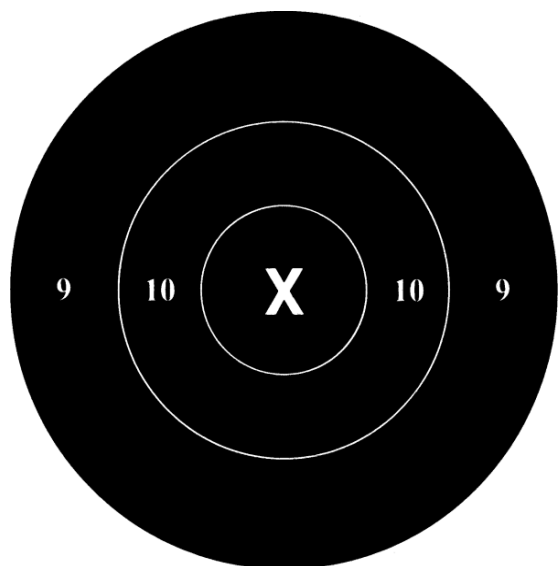

Anne Arundel Fish and Game Association and the Twelfth Precinct Pistol Club are hosting an introductory bullseye pistol clinic at Anne Arundel Fish and Game Association's range in Annapolis on March 28-29, 2015. This clinic will teach you everything you need to know to get started in the great sport of bullseye pistol shooting.

Each day will include classroom instruction and several hours of range time with experienced shooters helping you to develop and refine your technique. You will come away from this clinic with the training you need to participate in bullseye matches, all the bullseye books and instructional materials you will ever need, and a plan for continuing to improve your skills. Although this clinic is designed primarily for shooters with little or no experience in bullseye competition, marksman and sharpshooter class bullseye shooters are welcome and will have the opportunity to improve their skills and learn from some of the best bullseye shooters in Maryland.

What You Can Expect:

Saturday morning will begin with talks on firearms safety, the basic rules of bullseye competition, and an introduction to the fundamentals of pistol marksmanship. We will then proceed to the range for orientation and slow fire practice. After a break for lunch, we will resume with discussions of bullseye equipment and an introduction to reloading, and then return to the range for sustained fire practice. Sunday morning will include classroom sessions on advanced fundamentals, goal setting, mental preparation, and training for continuous improvement. All classroom sessions will include plenty of time for questions, and during range time you will work one-on-one with an experienced coach. Sunday afternoon will be devoted to additional range time, allowing you to pull together all that you have learned over the weekend. Shooters will leave with a good understanding of how to compete and succeed in bullseye pistol matches. Note – due to range restrictions, all shooting will be done with .22 pistols only!

Registration Fee:

The fee is \$60.00, or \$15.00 for juniors (ages 16-20), and includes all instruction, course materials, and lunch both days.

Contact Information:

Space is limited and pre-registration is required. To reserve a space, send your name, address, phone number, e-mail address, age (if under 21), and check (payable to John Hollingshead) to John Hollingshead at P.O. Box 1245, Olney, Maryland 20830. For more information, contact John at bullseyeclinic@hotmail.com.

Age Requirements:

Minimum age to participate is 16. Participants under 21 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian (parent or guardian need not participate).

Dates and Time:

The clinic will be held (rain or shine!) on Saturday, March 28 from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., and Sunday, March 29 from 9:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Directions:

The clinic will be held at Anne Arundel Fish and Game Association at 1730 Saint Margarets Road in Annapolis (about 3 miles west of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge off Route 50). From Route 50 eastbound, take exit 28 (Bay Dale Drive) to the stop sign on the service road. From Route 50 westbound, take exit 28 (Bay Dale Drive) and cross over Route 50 to the stop sign on the service road. Turn left at the stop sign and proceed toward the Red Hot & Blue Restaurant (in the windmill). At the restaurant, turn right onto Old Mill Bottom Road. At the next intersection, turn right onto Saint Margarets Road (Route 179). Continue 0.7 mile on Saint Margarets Road to club entrance on the right, just before crossing Mill Creek. Park in the paved lot on top of the hill and proceed to the clubhouse.



Bullseye Pistol

It's mid-winter, cold and mean. Perfect for trying your hand at Bullseye. During the winter the competitive pace slows, there is more time for learning and experimentation, and we have infrared heaters to take the chill off the firing line.

Also known as NRA Conventional Pistol, Bullseye has been around for a long time. Its origins trace back to the revolver era, and in fact some Bullseye matches today still require the use of a revolver. While those matches are great fun, most Bullseye is shot with semi-autos.

Bullseye is characterized by one-handed shooting at what can seem like impossibly small turning targets at 50 and 25 yards. The match structure is built around slow fire (10 rounds in 10 minutes @50 yds), timed fire (two strings of 5 rounds each fired in 20 seconds @25 yds), and rapid fire (two strings of 5 rounds each fired in 10 seconds @25 yds). All shooting is done from one position – standing. Well-trained Bullseye shooters will eventually get to the point where they can often hit the 10 ring at 50 yards. The 10 ring is about the size of a teacup.

A word about guns – while almost any pistol can be used for Bullseye, in a practical sense you will need an accurate and easy-to-shoot pistol designed for the task. It is most fun to learn to shoot Bullseye beginning with a 22 target pistol. While your trusted defensive autoloader can be used, it is literally too much of a handful when you are learning the sport. Instead, borrow or buy a target quality 22, find a brick or two of ammo, and start with that. Not all 22 target pistols are created equal – see the website <http://www.bullseyepistol.com/equipmnt.htm> for details. It is also generally a risky idea to trust a sales person to have solid knowledge about what is a Bullseye-capable gun. Some do, but most don't.

The next step is easy – every Tuesday at 10 AM we have a training/practice session. Let us know you are coming and we will start you down the road to pistol marksmanship and good times. You can reach Mike McGrath at mm909@comcast.net or Paul Striffler at pjstriff@gmail.com.
